How does someone with a dual-sensory loss manage to benefit with virtual teaching and communication? Our Spring Intervention Program had a decrease in participation, due to COVID-19. Direct support was not an option. However, what began as a potential limitation has become a new way of support for CDBA-BC!

...I cannot tell you how heartwarming this whole process has been – to be able to include families from all over our province for these Summer Recreation Zoom Activities has been wonderfully rewarding. We have decided this form of activity will always be something we offer, as well as our face-to-face activities (when we are able to resume them). We are already thinking about an October Harvest Series and a Winter Series!"

As mentioned in the article, online Intervention cannot, and will not, replace direct Intervention support, but it has been a great learning experience and does offer many unique opportunities and benefits. If you want to read more, you'll have to check out the magazine!



Intervenor Resource Team

The addition of an Intervenor Resource Team has greatly benefitted this new program. Each week, this group of experienced Intervenors would meet to plan and coordinate the activity for that week. Then, following the week's activity session, they would meet to discuss how the session went, what could be improved, what worked well/didn't work well. Together we have discovered the many Silver Linings of Virtual Programming – wonders that we never imagined could have come from this and benefits that we never thought possible in the world of deafblindness.

I am so very thankful for this team, as they brought to the table a potpourri of experience and amazing insight that ensured a wonderful sensory experience for each participant. Many thanks to our team: Katie Carter-DesBiens, Mary Hennig, Paul Michaud, Bonnie Middlemiss, Suzanne Shephard, Joleen Turgeon, Tracey Vath and Linda Mamer – this program could not have happened without your expertise and dedication.

Things We've Learned About Remote Online Instruction

The following is a compilation of what we have learned through our Virtual Programming.

ROUTINE

- AMCC Anticipation, Motivation, Communication and Confirmation: allows for Successful Intervention.
- ANTICIPATION/CONFIRMATION: consistent beginning and ending, as with the Hello and Goodbye songs.
- ANTICIPATION/MOTIVATION: shipping boxes of craft supplies to child's home builds excitement.
- ANTICIPATION/COMMUNICATION: ASL 'Signs of the Week' to be introduced at same part of each activity allows for review of previous signs, tying activities together and creating a memory of each experience.

PREPARATION

- COLLABORATION: creation of an Intervenor Resource Team to discuss and plan activities ensures the activities will meet the dual-sensory needs of the participants.
- PROCESS vs. PRODUCT: sending supply lists prior to activity allows for preparation and planning.
- Shipping craft supplies and supply lists to child's home prior to activity allows for review of supplies and discussion around preparation "What do we still need?" "What do we already have?"

MULTI-SENSORY

- Diversity of activities and supplies to meet the needs of all participants at one time or another.
- Including an Intervenor to sing and play guitar adds another sensory element.
- Allowing participants to take leadership, such as introducing the 'Signs of the Week', sharing a story, playing piano.
- Allowing and encouraging different methods, ideas and strategies during the activity think 'outside the box'.

TOTAL COMMUNICATION

- Including ASL 'Signs of the Week'.
- Adding an ASL Interpreter.
- 'Do with, not for' allowing time for everyone to complete each step before moving on.
- Allow for sharing of stories, activities of the week, exciting events. Networking.
- Animate voice, actions and sounds to ensure participants maintain interest.

VIRTUAL PRESENTATION

- Keep atmosphere fun and light.
- Ensure background and working space is simple not cluttered.
- Wear simple, bright clothing.
- Taking turns with presenting allows for continued interest of participants.
- Never assume something won't work we have been pleasantly surprised through all of our sessions, never anticipating the wonder of these sessions.

Deafblind Awareness Month



June is National Deafblind Awareness Month. Many people take for granted how we receive information through our eyes and ears - whether it's conversation, news articles, or the television - but these ways of receiving information that most take for granted can have many barriers for a person that is deafblind. Deafblind Awareness Month is decidedly in June to mark and celebrate Helen Keller's birth month as her journey with the help of her Intervenor, Annie Sullivan, diminished many of these barriers.

Since 2015, we have celebrated Deafblind Awareness Month across Canada and this year in recognition of National Deafblind Awareness Month, five B.C. landmark buildings were lit up in blue – BC Place, Surrey Civic Center, Anvil Centre, Vancouver City Hall, and Rogers Arena. Opportunities to meet and learn from professionals, consumers and family members from around the world and discover similarity of goals through CDBA's international connection with Deafblind International (DbI)


